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Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 July 2019

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 July 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

Mind Your Head was born as a result of funds raised at Gary Manson's funeral in 2004. Gary suffered from mental health problems for many years and was unable to find the kind of sustained therapeutic support that he could have benefited from in Shetland.

Since Gary's death and the creation of Mind Your Head we have also received donations from a variety of sources. There is no doubt that Mind Your Head has struck a chord with many people in the community and we feel strongly that Mind Your Head should be a sustainable group that can aim to reduce the stigma of mental ill health that continues to exist in Shetland and to help fill some gaps that exist in the current service provision.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

We want Shetland to be a place where mental health is supported positively within the community and people do not feel isolated because of mental illness.

Outcomes

- People do not feel isolated
- People are more aware and understanding
- · People know where to access help
- People are able to access support services
- People are more able to offer support to one and other
- Mind Your Head is a thriving organisation delivering to the Shetland community
- Mind Your Head is supported by the local community

Objectives

- Deliver an informed annual programme of awareness raising activities throughout Shetland which explore and improve understanding of mental health and wellbeing in the community
- Improve access to support and information relating to mental health and wellbeing and in doing so successfully launch support services targeted at young people and adults
- Ensure our organisation's programmes, activities and services are monitored, evaluated and planned efficiently
 with effective governance and appropriate management of finance, administration and staffing

Purposes

Powers

The organisation has power to do anything which is calculated to further its purposes or is conducive or incidental to doing so.

No part of the income or property of the organisation may be paid or transferred (directly or indirectly) to the members - either in the course of the organisation's existence or on dissolution - except where this is done in direct furtherance of the organisation's charitable purposes.

Significant Activities

In order to achieve the charity's objectives Mind Your Head will seek to pursue the following activities:

- To secure funding for the proposed adult support service.
- To deliver Grubby Hut sessions within male dominated workplaces.
- To participate in Shetland wide campaigns where resources allow.
- To hold fundraising and awareness raising events throughout the year. These events will promote mental health and wellbeing encouraging people to speak more openly about mental ill health.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Wellness Programme and Wellness Together Programme

As of the 31st July 2019 we had received 328 referrals across both services. We have seen increases at certain times of the year regarding referrals but have always maintained a steady flow and immensely proud of the fact that we support roughly the same number of male clients and female clients.

The service is widely known across Shetland and its isles and has an excellent reputation amongst professionals and people that have used it. The majority of referrals to the service are still self-referrals but over the year we have seen increases in referrals from GPs Advanced Nurse Practitioners, Health Visitors, Employers and Maternity Services to name a few.

Since the launch of the service we have received feedback form GPs who have seen a decrease in the number of patients attending their practice for a chat and reassurance around their mental health and wellbeing. We provide a much-needed service for GPs and Nurses to signpost to, and this is reflected by the many clients who state their GP recommended us.

We have worked with a varied group of people with a wide range of needs right across the Shetland Islands. An example of this would be the work we have done with families. We have seen several generations of family members access the service. We have also supported numerous couples where the husband may be receiving support for his mental health and wellbeing but his wife will be receiving support via our Wellness Together Programme to help identify ways she can support her husband but also look after herself as well.

In July we started a pilot project supporting one individual via Option 1 of Self Directed Support. If successful, we plan to take on more clients later this year.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

- We continue to loan out SAD lamps to the public and continue to be as popular as in recent years.
- We launched the Feel Good Bags in May 2019. These bags are free to anyone aged 16 years and over and the
 contents are designed to inspire self-care practice. People can nominate themselves or others.
- The Act of Kindness advent calendar took place in December and we saw an increase in local companies donating prizes for the calendar.

Fundraising activities

- Mind Your Head raised £26,293 this year which was raised by the annual Fun Run and charitable donations.
- We are currently designing a Fundraising Pack to hand out to people who are fundraising on our behalf as part
 of our Website and social media-marketing plan.

Children's and Young Persons Support

We conducted a six-month research project identifying any gaps in provision for children and young people in terms of mental health and wellbeing support. A report was presented to the board and we plan to apply for funding to develop these services in 2020.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Investment policy and objectives

Given that all funds are likely to be required in the short term, the Trustees consider the most appropriate investment policy is to hold the Trust's funds with the bank.

Reserves policy

The Charity's reserves policy is to maintain a sufficient level of reserves to enable operating activities to be maintained, taking account of potential risks and contingencies that may arise from time to time. The Committee have reviewed possible financial risks which may arise during the next three financial years to assist with its business and financial planning process and have identified the projected level of reserves which is required to manage these risks.

The balance held as unrestricted funds at 31 July 201 was £80,468 of which £77,809 are regarded as free reserves, after allowing for funds tied up in tangible fixed assets. Actual 3 month cash payments totalled £31,110. The current level of reserves is therefore higher than is needed.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Risk Review

The Trustees have conducted their own review of the major risks to which the charity is exposed and policies and systems have been established to mitigate those risks. As funding for the support service is only for three years the Trustees have a policy to consider next steps 18 months prior to the final claim dates for these funds to establish continuation or otherwise of the service.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document- SCIO constitution and constitutes an incorporated charity.

Mind Your Head formally adopted its Constitution on 23 January 2007 at its inaugural meeting and elected its first Management Committee.

Mind Your Head obtained charitable status on 21 June 2007 when it was registered with the Office of the Scottish Charities Regulator (OSCR).

In 2017 Mind Your Head became a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO).

Organisational structure

The Management Committee holds regular meetings and generally controls and supervises the activities of the charity. In particular, the Management Committee is responsible for monitoring the financial position of the charity.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 July 2019

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Fixtures and fittings

- 25% on cost

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
